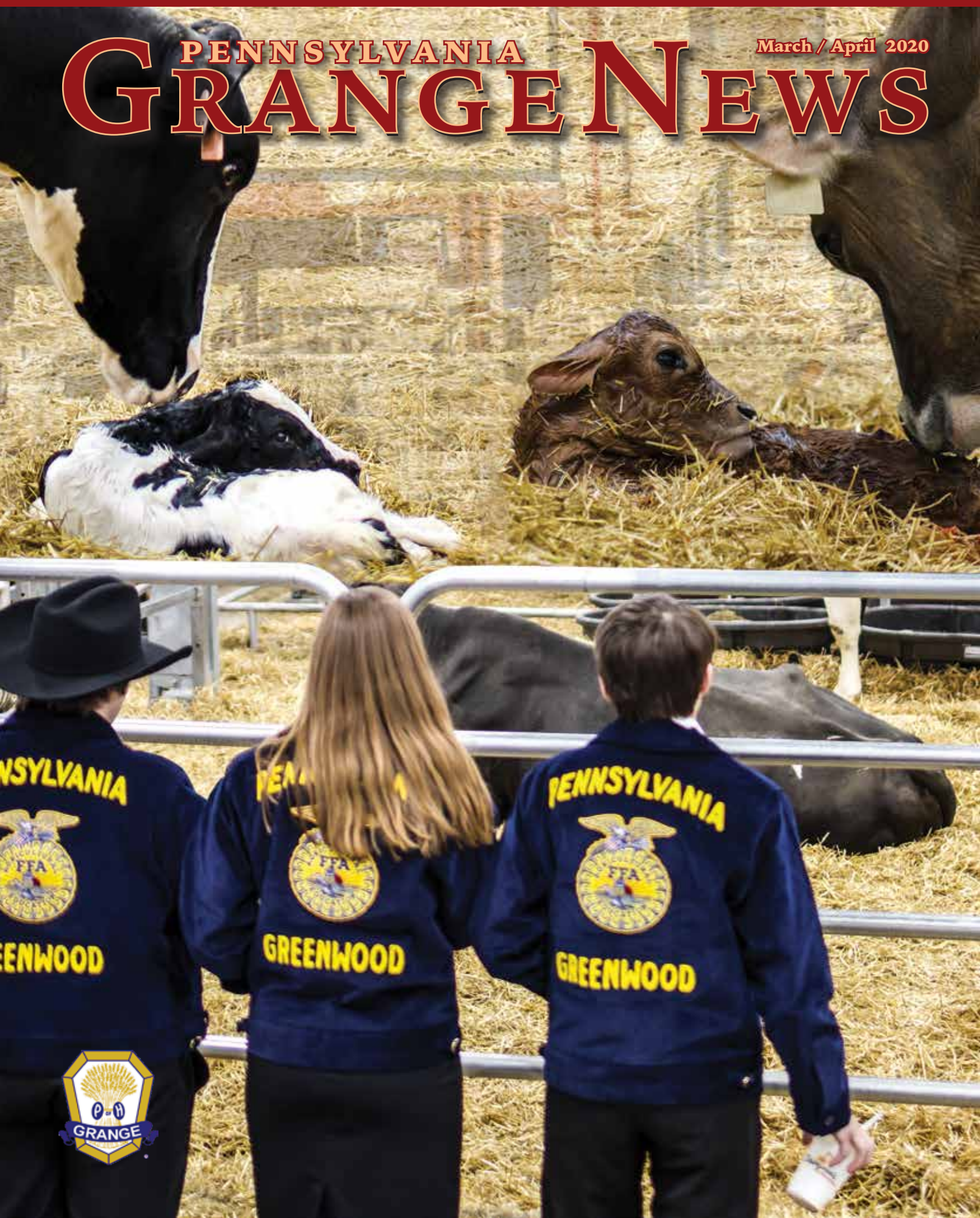

story on it. Need a good resource center for a speaker? Contact your local Penn State Extension office. They offer a very valuable wealth of information on an extensive list of subjects.

The Pennsylvania State Grange will be doing a Day on the Hill event again this year. Please look for the sign up information in this edition of the Grange News. I would encourage you to participate in the Day on the Hill event and spend some time with your legislator. They can only represent you if you communicate with them and let them know your position on the issues.

Reflection & Celebration

I am still surrounded by our Christmas tree and decorations as I sit down to write my article for the March-April issue. We have just **celebrated the wonder of the Savior's birth** and read and heard and sang about the significance of it: Glory to God in the highest and on earth, **peace** and goodwill. We were in such a happy mood.

Now just a few months later, we are in the middle of another season leading up to a **celebration of our Savior's death**. The tinsel, the twinkling lights, the beautiful tree top stars, the various versions of the nativity scene and the bright red bows of the *Christmas season* are long packed away.

Now the mood has changed. We are in the *Lenten season*. We see pictures of the donkey ride, the waving palms, Jesus' Last Supper with his beloved disciples, the trial, the mockery, the long painful trek to Calvary, the agonizing torturous death on the cross, and the heartbreaking moments for Mary the mother who carried and delivered the baby Jesus. We sing the somber tunes depicting this period in Jesus' life. The one bright promise we hold on to is when Jesus told his disciples

"I have told you many things so that you may have **peace**. In this world you will have many troubles, but do not be afraid..... **peace** I leave with you. My **peace** I give you."

The Common Thread

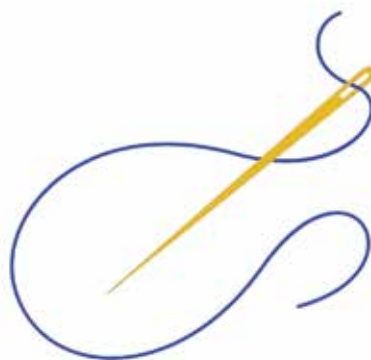
Over the past 12 months I have been working closely with Barb Gross, Granger from Scrubgrass Grange in Venango County, on the expansion of the Pennsylvania State Grange Heritage Quilt Trail at the PA Farm Show complex. It has been quite an educational journey for me as she provided me with information, reference books, and stories to have a better understanding on quilt blocks and their designs.

In talking with Barb about this and that regarding Grange, it brought back some memories. I grew up through the 70's and came to love watching the TV show, "Little House on the Prairie." I was drawn to their way of life; with all the struggles and challenges of living in the West in the 1800's. Sev-

eral of the show's story lines were about Pa being a Granger. The Grange was part of their life.

As a youth I first learned about sewing at school through the home economics program taught by Mrs. Joan Keith. My interest in sewing grew and my Gram and mom cultivated that interest by showing me how to piece material together to make quilt tops. Mrs. Keith was a Granger with Lincoln Grange.

As a teenager and young adult every summer we looked forward to attending the county fair. Mom and I would walk around the fair



looking at exhibits. Mom would stop at the Grange booth to see what cookbooks were for sale. There was a Grange hall not too far from where we lived and we would occasionally attend a community dinner.

When I was working at a booth at the Shippensburg Fair in 2006, the Kitners' were the Young Adult Married Couple at that time and they stopped by to talk to me. They shared so enthusiastically about their Grange and all the things

that Grange did in their community. It was exciting to talk to them and that is when the idea of a Grange in Shippensburg started.

I hadn't realized that Grange was a common thread in my life as I think back on some of these memories. I'm not sure why my family didn't join Grange when I was younger, but it doesn't surprise me that as an adult, Grange and I found each other.

Do you think that there are others like me? The people who know about Grange and attend events that maybe just need an enthusiastic invite to be part of your Grange. My whole life my path crossed with Grange, but until meeting the Kitners, that is when I really received an invite to participate and become a Granger.

Greetings from South Central PA!

I hope this article finds you well and looking forward to the warmer weather of spring! Spring is a time of growth and change. I hope that you use this season as an inspiration to do some exciting new things in your Grange this year. Try some new and different programs, encourage your members to participate in some of the new State Grange contests and programs for this year, and engage in conversations in your Grange about how to grow your membership. Lecturers have a unique and important role to play in this growth! Interesting, educational, and relevant programs have the opportunity to draw potential new members to your meetings or entice inactive current members to come back. Do not be afraid to think outside of the box!

Updates to the 2020-21 Guide to Contests and Programs

There are a few updates to the Lecturer's Contests and Programs since the Guide was printed. The updated guide is available on the website, but I wanted to draw your attention to them.

First, starting in 2020, Lecturer's Reports and Scrapbooks will be judged separately. Ribbons will be awarded for 1st through 4th places for reports AND scrapbooks. Additionally, monetary prizes will

be given for the 1st place winners in each class for reports (\$10) and scrapbooks (\$50). Community Night/Day (Open House) Reports will be judged as they have been with 1st place winners in each class receiving a plaque.

Second, the membership classes for Subordinate Lecturer's Reports/Scrapbooks and Community Night/Day (Open House) Reports were quite unbalanced this past year. In an effort to create more equitable competition, the membership classes have been revised to 1) Up to **50** members; 2) **51-99** members; and 3) **100** or more members.

Finally, this past year, we had no entries in the Pen in Hand contest. This is a great opportunity for members to showcase their creative writing skills. A new class has been added to replace the "Book/Film Review" class. The new class is "**My Favorite Grange Memory...**" with a word limit of 500 words. So, the three classes for Pen in Hand are: 1) Poetry (300 words max); 2) Short Story (1,500 words max); and 3) My Favorite Grange Memory..." (500 words max).

Please refer to the updated Guide on the website and feel free to contact me with any questions about these changes or any of the contests and programs within the Lecturer's Department. It's never too early to get started on your entries for this fall!

By the time you receive this newsletter, you should have re-

ceived or will soon be receiving the Lecturer's Department mailing with the 2020 report forms and more information about State and National Grange programs.

This is a great opportunity to hear about new programs offered by all of the Pennsylvania State Grange departments and to get meaningful training in a variety of areas. These include how to conduct and participate in Grange meetings, how to handle tricky questions you might hear while talking with others about the Grange, and how to make our Granges more hospitable and welcoming to potential new members. Program Ideas

March

March 3 – Super Tuesday – This is the day during the Presidential Primary season when the greatest number of states hold their primary elections or caucuses. Have an educational program about the Presidential Election (information about the candidates, how the party conventions and securing the party's nomination work, how the electoral college works and why it exists, etc.). Just remember that the Grange is a non-partisan organization, so make sure any program about politics remains balanced and unbiased.

March 25 – National/World Agriculture Day – Celebrate the Grange's work for rural America by honoring members who are actively working in agriculture or agricultural-related industries. Hold a covered dish dinner and reflect on all that goes into bringing the food to our tables.

April

April is Grange Month! Host an Open House/Community Day to

let others in your community know what your Grange is all about. Reach out to the State Grange History Committee if you are interested in a prepared historical PowerPoint presentation that can be customized and shared at an Open House event or as a program at a regular meeting.

April 12 – Easter – Have an Easter Egg Hunt for your members! Hide little pieces of paper with Easter trivia inside the eggs and have participants find and pair the questions with the answers in the eggs and then share with the group!

May

May 7 – National Tourism Day – Have members share their favorite vacation or tourist destinations.

May 20 – Be a Millionaire Day – While this may be a far-fetched idea for most of us, it's never a bad idea to make sure that we are making the best financial decisions. Invite a financial planner to talk about options and opportunities to make the most of our money.

Looking Toward 150th

With the microfilming and digitizing of State Grange records finished except for future documents, the efforts of the History Committee are now directed toward the 150th anniversary of the organization of the Pennsylvania State Grange. Although the Grange came to Pennsylvania in March, 1871 with the formation of Eagle #1 in Lycoming County, the initial movement was slow becoming established so it was not until September 18, 1873, that representatives from 22 of the 25 local Granges organized in the State up to that time met in Reading to formally organize the State Grange.

So, starting in 2021 with the 150th anniversary of Eagle Grange #1 and continuing through 2023, Pennsylvania Grangers will be celebrating this significant historical milestone. State President Campbell last year appointed the History Committee to be in charge of the anniversary observance and numerous brainstorming/planning meetings have already taken place. The goal of the celebration will be:

- To educate Grange members and public about the significant

history and accomplishments of the Grange in Pennsylvania,

- To inspire current Grange members and renew their commitment to advancing the order, and
- To reach out to the larger community with a message about the Grange and its purposes today.

As this article is being written in early January (2020), contacts are being made for the kick-off event to be held in Lycoming County on a Saturday in April, 2021. Tentatively, an open house

Pennsylvania, that same light will be distributed to every county and into every active Grange.

A resolution passed by the delegates at the 2019 annual State Grange session approved the location of the 2023 session to be Reading, PA where the State Grange was organized and where the 75th, 100th and 125th anniversary celebrations were held. The normal convention hosting responsibilities by geographic regions of the state will be suspended for that year and all Granges in Pennsylvania will be called upon to provide the manpower and financial resources to make a really special session possible. At this point, plans are in the early stages for a historical pageant, special acts of service, an anniversary banquet and the conferral of the Fifth and Sixth Degrees in full form (including the beautiful and uniquely Pennsylvania Ceres, Pomona and Flora drills).

Watch for more details to be announced in the next issue and to learn about ways for every Grange and every member to become involved in the recognition of a century and a half of service.

The program will include a motivational speaker and a symbolic passing of the Grange light in a historically accurate way - from a representative of the National Grange to Eagle Grange, then to the other 24 original Subordinate Granges and finally to the State Grange. Catch the Contagious Virginville Vibe

During its Grange Centennial Celebrations



Tucked away in rural Richmond Township, northern Berks County, Pennsylvania, is a registered historic district of about fifty homes and a hundred and fifty residents. The Maiden Creek meanders south towards Reading, Pennsylvania, and is surrounded by fertile farmland and lush forests. An early Native American trading post and once a hub of activity during the robust days of the railroad, the thriving hamlet turned sleepy village named Virginville is no different from many small communities across the state.

Yet headquartered since 1950, in a modest building once housing the local fire department, is Virginville Grange, a community level organization of the Pennsylvania State Grange. Boasting nearly four hundred members, the Virginville chapter holds the largest membership body in the state and is a leading contender nationally. This year will mark a major milestone as Virginville Grange celebrates its centennial!

Many local level Granges sprung up in this region during the early twentieth century as news of the benefits of the national fraternal order for farm families spread. Early examples of influence included road improvements, electrification, and rural mail delivery. Although many members still have a direct connection to agriculture, the order has evolved and offers benefits for all of rural America. Today, National Grange is a major advocate for increased internet access in less populated areas of the country.

Eighty-nine men and women signed their names and chartered the Virginville establishment on February 24, 1920. The young Grange grew quickly as the membership, made up of predominately faith-based Pennsylvania German farmers, found a place for socialization and a broad range of services. Not conflicting with religion, the Grange in fact reinforced their beliefs through ritual by presenting the American flag and opening the Bible at each meeting.

In 1924, Virginville Grange began doing business with Eastern



Eastern States Farmer's Exchange

States Farmer's Exchange, a program allowing members to receive discounts for bulk orders of feed and supplies. Grangers served as agents for the exchange, and shipments came to town every two weeks by rail. This successful program continued until 1967.



Funnel Cake

Nearly seventy years ago, Virginville members began offering funnel cakes at a local folklife festival held in nearby Kutztown, Pennsylvania. This was the first time the homemade confection was offered in a commercial setting. This tradition is still carried on by Virginville members during the nine-day event each summer.

In 1954, a quilt made by Virginville members won first place in a National Grange contest of more than 500 entries. Filled with Grange pride, members traveled to Washington, DC, to present this work of art to Mamie Eisenhower, the first lady of the United States of America.

More smiles for the group came in 1957 when Virginville Junior Grange was chartered to offer the Grange experience to children ages five to fourteen. Honored with the prestigious Junior Grange of the Nation Award in 1984, this segment continues today at the same level of prosperity as its parent.

Looking for more fund-raising ideas, members filled roles in a home-spun play written by a fellow member. The entire production was

2011 So Gaed's "Evva" play revived

recited exclusively in the Pennsylvania Dutch (German) dialect and presented for the first time in 1958. The three-act comedy was revived in 1985 and 2011 and has proven to be one of the largest fund-raising events, raising \$10,000 in 2011 alone.

Each year since 1959, thousands of people have enjoyed Virginville's longest running event, an all-you-can-eat Mother's Day feast served annually at the Grange hall. Various other banquets, fairs, festivals, sandwich sales, and public auctions have provided opportunities as well.

In 1997, members organized a farm safety day to raise awareness of agricultural related hazards in a rural setting to hundreds of members of the community. The event was so successful it captured the group the highest community ser-

vice award at National Grange that year.

The loss of generations sparked a need to document local history of the village and surrounding area, so members became involved during 2002-2003 in the creation of a local hardbound history book entitled *The History of Virginville*. The Grange backed the project financially and sales reached one thousand copies.

Extreme Makeover Home Edition, the renowned ABC reality television show, came to nearby Hamburg, Pennsylvania, in 2010, to surprise a family and build them a new home in one week. Virginville Grangers pitched in by preparing a buffet-style meal served on site for the production staff and volunteers.

Over the years as the organization grew, so did the need for more space. Numerous additions and improvements have been made to the real estate. Most recent renovations during 2006-2007 boasted a generator, handicapped facilities, and an elevator setting the stage for the Grange hall to be a local emergency shelter.

Virginville's proudest outreach

moments are those dedicated to others. Years ago, members assisted those in need by harvesting crops, sharing food, or making repairs to buildings and equipment. In recent decades, barbecue chicken dinners, dances, raffles, and bingos are dedicated to barn fires, illnesses, accidents, misfortunes, law enforcement agencies, emergency response outfits, and other local non-profit efforts keeping members busy as they happily work together like a well-oiled machine to produce charitable funds in excess of \$100,000. In 2015, a benefit bonanza, including a raffle, bingo and dance, raised \$25,000 in honor of a seventeen-year-old Virginville Granger who successfully battled Hodgkin's lymphoma. The funds were paid forward by the member to three charities who supported her through her journey.

The highlight of Virginville's year is Community Night, drawing a crowd of 250 to the first meeting

On two occasions at the 2020 Farm Show, the Pennsylvania State Grange pressed the case for universal access to high-speed Broadband. These included a hearing of the House Agriculture & Rural Affairs Committee. The second was a panel discussion convened by the Grange to discuss several success stories in this quest.

HOUSE HEARING

Pennsylvania State Grange President Wayne Campbell presented testimony as part of a panel which also included PA Farm Bureau, PA Farmers Union, PA Association for Sustainable Agriculture and PennAg Industries Association.

The bulk of Campbell's testimony centered on Broadband. He compared the need of expanding Broadband access in this century to rural electrification in the 20th Century. Lack of universal access puts rural Pennsylvania way behind -- in production agriculture, in education, in economic investment, in health care, and in the conduct of everyday lives. That description sounds like rural America in the early part of the 20th Century before rural electrification.

The elephant in the room is how to pay for it.

The House Agriculture & Rural Affairs Committee was challenged by Campbell to introduce a res-

olution directing the Legislative Budget & Finance Committee or the Center for Rural PA to analyze funding options. Although the Grange is not endorsing a particular funding mechanism, one possibility cited by the Pennsylvania State Grange was a minimal surcharge from each cell phone per month. This option would need to include millions of cell phones in order to be viable. Nationally, for example, the March 20, 2018 Media Tech Reviews predicts 276.7 million cell phone subscribers in the U.S. in 2020. Since cell phone subscribers typically have more than one cell phone, the actual

numbers could be much higher. The number of Pennsylvania cell phones has not been verified -- hence, a need for the study.

Wayne Campbell lauded House passage of **House Bill 305** sponsored by Rep. Pam Snyder (D-Greene/Fayette/Washington) as a positive step. This legislation requires that Pennsylvania inventory state-owned structures to see if a telecommunications company could 'piggyback' equipment on a tower. If feasible, the telecom company would pay the Commonwealth a leasing fee.





Another accomplishment is the creation of the bipartisan House Broadband Caucus last session by Representative Pam Snyder and former Representative and now Senator Kristin Phillips-Hill. This session, the Republican co-chair is Representative Rich Irvin (R-Mifflin/Huntingdon/Centre). Hopefully, this Caucus will help legislators stay focused on this critical issue.

Currently, the House Broadband Caucus has 23 members. The group is bipartisan and includes twelve members from rural districts, five from suburban areas, and six from cities.

OTHER ISSUES PRESENTED BY THE PENNSYLVANIA STATE GRANGE

There were several other issues stressed by President Campbell at the House Agriculture & Rural Affairs Committee hearing.

Agritourism. First and foremost was **House Bill 1348** sponsored by Rep. Barb Gleim (R-Cumberland). This would limit liability for farms seeking an additional income stream from agritourism or agrientertainment. This limited liability would apply providing that visitors were warned about possible risks on a working farm and there were reasonable attempts to remove obvious hazards. Despite pushback by the trial lawyers, this legislation passed the House Agriculture & Rural Affairs Committee unanimously on June 5, 2019. Assuming that it passes the House, the PA Senate will also have to consider the bill before it goes to Governor Wolf for his signature.

Dairy. While **HB 1348** helps farmers in the longer term, an immediate need is more investment in PA-based regional dairy processing facilities. Fortunately, **House Bill 1223** was introduced by Rep. John Lawrence (R-Ches-

Quick Guide to Broadband Legislation

Given the increased interest in Broadband by the General Assembly, here is a handy listing of some of the Broadband bills supported by the Pennsylvania State Grange.

House Bill 305 and Senate Bill 470 (Snyder; Phillips-Hill)

Requires the state to inventory state-owned structures to determine which would be appropriate for 'piggybacking' telecommunications equipment. PA would lease the space on the structure for a fee. State Police structure leasing income would be dedicated to help fund State Police.

Senate Resolution 47 and House Resolution 64 (Phillips-Hill; Snyder)

Establishes a bicameral legislative task force to focus on Broadband expansion.

Senate Resolution 48 and House Resolution 63 (Phillips-Hill; Snyder)

Directs that non-rural telecommunications companies be audited to determine their compliance with existing laws regarding provision of Internet service.

House Bill 2055 (Snyder)

Allows municipal authorities to deploy Broadband Internet Infrastructure.

Senate Bill 835 (Langerholc)

Establishes a dedicated fund of not less than 10 million dollars to provide grants for expansion of Broadband to unserved areas.

Senate Bill 725 and House Bill 1585 (Yudichak; Wheatly)

Governor Wolf's Restore PA would borrow \$4.5 billion loan to be repaid by Marcellus Shale natural gas severance tax.

Senate Bill 712 (Argall)

Fiscal Code bill which includes specific monies for two north central PA economic development entities to develop a regional Broadband system. Status: Act 20 of 2019

House Bill 1400 (Farry)

Standardizes 'colocation' installation standards for small cell facilities (expanding Broadband in a limited range).

NOT YET INTRODUCED: (Irvin)

Preserves land line telephone service to rural areas (Universal Service Fund).

ter) to establish PA Dairy Keystone Opportunity Zones. These are designated areas within the state where investors in dairy processing could receive a variety of tax credits and other incentives.

Creating Dairy Keystone Opportunity Zones should incentivize investment in PA-based milk processing facilities. The legislation offers two benefits to farmers in addition to helping a local economy. First, a regional facility means less travel expense for milk

transport. Second, it will boost dairy farm revenues by allowing a greater over-order premium going back to the farmer. Currently, that revenue is often lost because the milk is produced in PA but processed out of state, meaning that the farmer loses out on the over-order premium income.

One point emphasized by Campbell was the need to take care of unfinished business from 2019. He said, "One thing that was unresolved in 2019 was

the issue of milk hauling. As you know, Governor Wolf vetoed **House Bill 915** sponsored by Chair Causser. Another milk hauling bill, **Senate Bill 588** sponsored by Senator Judy Ward from Blair County, also passed the Senate and is now in this committee. The question is what will finally happen to resolve this issue. When severe winter weather comes, milk haulers must still pick up milk from local dairy farms since farmers generally do not have a large storage capacity. This milk must then be transported to processing plants without delay. The committee should re-examine this issue and decide if the need warrants more legislative action."

GRANGE ISSUES THANK YOU TO REP. KELLER

The Pennsylvania State Grange issued a statement recognizing the service of Perry County Representative Mark Keller. Keller, a Republican, announced his decision not to seek re-election. The Grange lauded him for helping other legislators better understand the realities of farming today given his practical knowledge from farming. Keller is serving out the remainder of his term which ends November 30, 2020.

When President Campbell also publicly thanked Rep. Keller, before the House Agriculture & Rural Affairs Committee, the other legislators gave Keller an ovation.

Several other lawmakers with a strong interest in Grange issues have also announced plans to retire.

They include Rep. Marcia Hahn (R-Northumberland), a member of the House Agriculture & Rural Affairs Committee and Rep. Garth Everett (R-Lycoming). Everett is the current Chair of the House State Government Committee. Of note to Granges in areas where Marcellus Shale natural gas

is being extracted, Everett has introduced legislation forcing energy companies to pay property owners the full amount of royalties required by state law. Hahn and Everett will complete the rest of their terms this year.

THE GRANGE WANTS YOU TO BE RESOLVED

The Pennsylvania State Grange is responsive to its members. Lobbying and advocacy is based on what members say they want. In a nutshell, here is how Grange policy is set.

- What is the Need? What is important to you as a Grange member? Policy positions cover a wide range of topics.
- What is the Answer? If you identify a problem, do you have an idea as to how to confront the problem?
- How do I get my idea/solution to the point of being considered by the Pennsylvania State Grange?
 - Put it in writing. What that means is using a certain format to express your thoughts. This format is designed so that readers can see the need (these are the WHEREAS clauses) and the policy you want the Grange to adopt (the BE IT RESOLVED clauses).
 - Utilize State Grange staff to help you draft it. Usually, this is a five to ten-minute conversation. Then, you receive a draft. Keep in mind that when you receive a draft, it is a draft. Make it yours. Review it to be sure that the draft language is true to your point. Again, staff will help re-draft if needed.
 - Take your draft resolution to your Grange and talk with others. Your Grange needs to make a decision to move the resolution on to the state

level. Resolutions may come from Pomona Granges as well.

- Resolution Committee. On September 17, 2020, the Pennsylvania State Grange will convene a meeting of the different resolution committees to review each resolution. This Resolution meeting is made up of specific committees. Committees are organized as to subject matter, for example, agriculture. The committee can choose to favorably report the resolution to the Delegate Body, may reject, or amend. Please understand that if the committee rejects a resolution, it does not have the final word. Delegates to the October State Session do.
- At the State Session, delegates consider each resolution. The State Session can adopt the resolution to become state policy. It can reject it. It can overrule the recommendation of the resolutions committee and adopt a resolution anyway. It can also amend a resolution. That is how Grange policies are set.
- At the State Session, some older resolutions are retired and put in archives when their original purpose is irrel-

evant. An example in 2019 was the retiring of a resolution that was approved as policy in 2006. The text and explanation of this archived resolution follows.

MEDICARE USE OF SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBERS

The Grange supports the implementation of a Federal law mandating that the Medicare system use an identification number other than the individual's Social Security number and supports the universal implementation of such a law across all insurance providers.

REASON FOR ARCHIVING

Beginning in 2018, the Social Security Administration converted Medicare identification numbers to another numbering system.

Vince Phillips is the lobbyist for the Pennsylvania State Grange. He has lobbied in PA since 1989, coming from the Nation's Capitol where, among other things, he served on President Reagan's Transition Team and held a Reagan Administration appointment at USDA.

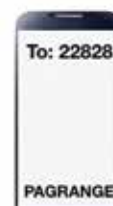
